A TIME FOR POPPIES

Yes folks, the Poppy Campaign is on, which means that Remembrance Day is just around the corner. In Coldwater and around the country, the month of November brings out the little red flower on jackets, hats, in store fronts, and, in this Facebook and Twitter era, all over our phone and laptop screens. Official symbol of Remembrance in Canada and in many parts of the world, the Poppy is worn to honour the close to 115,000 Canadian soldiers, sailors and air force personnel who gave their lives in the service of our country.

A whole century has passed since the first commemoration of the 1918 armistice that brought an end to the First World War. This November 1919 initial show of respect to the more than 66,000 Canadians who were left on the battlefields during "The Great War" has since evolved into our annual Remembrance Day in Canada. There would be 46,000 more war dead in the Second World War, 500 in Korea, and to this day, 1,800 more in various operations around the world. On Monday, November 11, at 10:30 a.m., we will honour them through a Remembrance Day Ceremony that will take place at the Coldwater Cenotaph, across from Royal Canadian Legion Branch 270 Coldwater. We hope you can join us.

Please volunteer some tagging time. The Poppy Campaign is the most important source of funding for the Legion's Veterans support programme and anyone can help. No special skill required.

BRANCH HISTORIAN REPORT

Submitted by Comrade Norm Marion, Branch Historian CENOTAPH PLAQUE: We are still waiting for a quote for the Second World War plaque to be added to the Cenotaph. Incidentally, a fourth name has been confirmed to be added to the Second World War list of killed in action. Born in Coldwater in 1921, Flying Officer Manley Lyall Brechin was killed in action when the Wellington bomber aircraft he flew was lost during a mission over the Mediterranean on August 24, 1943. He has no known grave, but is commemorated on the Malta War Memorial, in Malta.

QUERY ABOUT SERGEANT MOWBRAY "MOBE" SHAW: I've been contacted by Michael Harwood, who is researching the life and times of Sergeant Milton Mowbray "Mobe" Shaw, a highly decorated Second World War veteran who later served as an instructor at Camp Borden. Apparently, he and his wife Friedel, were active members of the Coldwater Legion until Mobe's death in 2000. Michael is interested in speaking with any Coldwater Legion members who may have interesting anecdotes about Mobe.

MILITARY SERVICE RECOGNITION BOOK: Volume VI of the Military Service Recognition Book (MSRB) is now available. You will find seven Coldwater people in there, including two of our First World War Killed in Action. You can get a copy at the office.

LEGION POLICY: STOLEN VALOUR

Branches may become aware of suspected cases of Stolen Valour through a number of possible ways:

- From members,
- From Legion Levels of Authority who would in turn have found out through a member complaint or from Stolen Valour Canada (SVC),
- On line, through social media, report from the public, or the SVC website.

In any of these cases, it is important to respect our members' right to due process and to have their side heard. At the same time, fraudulent wearing of medals or uniforms is a federal crime, and branch executives are responsible to protect their branch's reputation and the reputation of the Royal Canadian Legion.

When made aware of suspected Stolen Valour, branch Presidents are to:

- Identify someone who can speak to the person accused of Stolen Valour. That individual can be the President themselves, or a trusted member of the branch who the person accused is comfortable talking to,
- Explain the accusation to the person, and explain the potential impact on the branch and the Legion if it were to be true.
- Give the person the opportunity to tell their side of the story. Ideally, the conversation will either clear up the situation by providing the President evidence that there is no case, or it will allow the person accused the opportunity to understand the potential harm they could cause and give them an opportunity to redeem themselves by surrendering those items that they were wearing fraudulently.
- Report to their Command headquarters through the appropriate channels how the issue has been resolved.

If the individual in question refuses to surrender the decorations or medals and cannot provide a reasonable explanation as to their validity, a branch president has some options:

- They can notify law enforcement authorities of an alleged breach of Criminal Code S. 419,
- If any member believes that the alleged Stolen Valour constitutes conduct that brings or tends to bring the Legion into discredit, a complaint can be lodged under

Article III of the General By-Laws. As per General By-Law 304H, a branch president may deprive the member against whom the complaint is lodged of clubhouse privileges and remove them from office or position.

It is not recommended that the branch President officially engage with or solicit assistance from SVC; they are not an arm or resource of the Royal Canadian Legion and should not be treated as such. However, the member accused of Stolen Valour are to be made aware that SVC rarely lets an allegation go if they believe they have a case.

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
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INTRODUCING VETERAN RICK MORSE

In 1977 Comrade Rick looked over the smoggy Hamilton industrial landscape. This was not for him! His father was a Korean War Veteran. Hence, Comrade Rick's decision to join the military was not a foreign concept. Comrade Rick fondly recalls his first eleven weeks of basic training at the Canadian Forces Recruit School in Cornwallis, Nova Scotia, the first of many challenges to impact his life. After basic training, he worked as an Administration Clerk where he was responsible for the administration of military personnel. This job allowed Comrade Rick to be of service in the Army, Navy or Air Force.

His forty-year career with the military included many jobs, many postings and opportunities to learn and develop new skills.

Comrade Rick recalls the following with pride and fondness: *A couple of tours in the Training Systems (Cornwallis and Borden);

- *First posting was for three years Cold Lake, Alberta;
- *Served with 4-Combat Engineer Regiment in Lahr West Germany- Comrade Rick took the opportunity to work alongside the Engineers laying mine fields;
- *While with 4 CER Comrade Rick had the humbling opportunity to participate in the Canadian Liberation March through Belgium. The route of this march is 33 km in length and takes the same path as the Canadian Army did while liberating Belgium in 1944, and the 40th Anniversary Ceremonies of the Dieppe Raid in both England and Dieppe, France in August 1982;
- *After his posting to Lahr, he spent 2 years as Chief Clerk of 2 Commando, Canadian Airborne Regiment, and while serving with the Regiment, he participated in a 6-month United Nations Tour in Cyprus;
- *Returning from Cyprus, he transferred to North Bay for 3 years;
- *From North Bay he transferred to Cornwallis and pursued a job as a Basic Training Recruit Instructor for 4 years;
- *8 years at Canadian Forces Base, Trenton where he held a variety of positions: Warrant Officer in charge of the Wing Orderly Room; Chief Clerk of the Canadian Parachute Centre; *While serving at Trenton, participated in a 6-month tour at Canadian Forces Station Alert, Nunavut; *Participated in a year-long French language training programme in Trenton;
- *Posted to 32 Brigade Headquarters in Toronto for 3 years; *Add here Comrade Rick's second tour of training with the Canadian Forces School of Administration and Logistics at

Canadian Forces Base, Borden, where he was the Sergeant Major of the training cadre for the Resource Management Support (RMS) occupation;

*After Borden, a return to Toronto as the 4th Canadian Division
