DIEPPE - 80 YEARS AGO

This month marks the 80th anniversary of the Second World War ill-fated Dieppe Raid. The following is a summary of the events that took place on the coast of France on August 12, 1942, courtesy of Veterans Affairs Canada.

Many factors contributed to the decision to mount a large raid into occupied Europe in 1942. The Soviet Union was pressuring the Allied forces to open a second front in Western Europe. The Allies, however, needed more time to build up their military resources before undertaking such a massive effort. They felt that a large raid on the coast of France, however, could force the Germans to divert more of their military resources away from the Soviet Union and also help in the planning for the full-scale Allied assault that would eventually have to take place.

The Dieppe Raid, code-named "Operation Jubilee," saw more than 6,000 men come ashore at five different points along a 16 kilometre stretch of heavily defended coastline. The raiding force was made up of almost 5,000 Canadians, approximately 1,000 British commandos and 50 American Army Rangers.

Things immediately went wrong for the landing force on the eastern flank. They encountered a small German convoy and the ensuing firefight alerted the enemy. The soldiers that came ashore at Berneval and Puys consequently were met with overwhelming fire and some of the heaviest Allied losses took place there.

Some objectives on the western flank were achieved and the enemy gun batteries at Varengeville were destroyed. In Pourville, the South Saskatchewan Regiment and the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders came ashore and pushed towards their goals. The mounting German resistance, however, would force them to withdraw with heavy losses.

Running behind schedule, the main force going ashore at Dieppe landed as daylight was breaking. The German troops, now alerted to the raid, cut down many Canadians as they waded in the surf. Nevertheless, many of our soldiers fought their way across the cobblestone beach to the relative protection of the seawall. The same

cobblestones and seawall made it hard for the Allied tanks to move off the beach and the fierce enemy fire prevented engineers from clearing the way for them to push their way into the town.

Small groups from the Royal Hamilton Light Infantry and the Essex Scottish Regiment were able to fight their way into the bullet-swept streets of Dieppe. It was clear, however, that the raid could not continue and the retreat soon began. Trying to evacuate everyone, however, would mean the probable destruction of the Allied naval force. Through great courage, many men were taken off the beaches under heavy fire, but by early afternoon the last boat had departed. Left in a hopeless situation, the remaining Canadians were forced to surrender. The raid was over.






SERVICE OFFICER REPORT

In the next three Maple Leafs I will be focusing on some interesting facts concerning our Armed Forces taken from the 2021 census. Many of you participated in Canada's census in 2021. Once a decade from 1951 up to 1971, Statistics Canada asked Canadians about their military service. However, the 2021 census marks the first time Statistics Canada asked Canadians whether they were active Canadian Armed Forces members serving in the Regular Force or Primary Reserve Force. In this first article I present some highlights.

In 2021, a total of 97,625 Canadians were reported in the census as serving in the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) as members of the Regular Force or Primary Reserve Force. For more than 100 years, women have contributed to Canada's military heritage and, in 2021, almost one-fifth of currently serving Canadian military enumerated in the census were women. The CAF were younger on average (36.2 years old) than the employed labour force overall (41.9), but currently serving were older than their male counterparts.

Ontario 35.4% and Quebec 20.2% had the highest share of currently serving military personnel. Belleville-Quinte West and Kingston had the largest share of military personnel among Canada's census metropolitan areas, given that they are both in close proximity to military bases. In 2021, a total of 461,240 Canadians were counted as Veterans in the census. Many of you will be surprised as to the makeup and just how our military personnel reflect Canadian society. BRANCH HISTORIAN REPORT

Submitted by Comrade Norm Marion, Branch Historian I recently met with the curator of the Coldwater Canadiana Museum to discuss ways that the Branch and the museum could help each other, particularly in the areas of local military history and artefacts. The museum has on display some interesting items relating to one of our Coldwater soldiers killed in action during the First World War, Arnot Leatherdale. This includes his medals, his Memorial Plaque, several original documents, and a great photo of him in uniform — which I scanned for our collection. I was asked to give a presentation on Coldwater's military history, at the museum, on Aug 18. You can read more about Gunner Arnot Leatherdale on this page.

LEATHERDALE, ARNOT THOMAS

Arnot Thomas Dale Leatherdale was born on June 12, 1897, the son of Luke and Amelia Leatherdale of Eplett Street in Coldwater. He enlisted with the Canadian Expeditionary Force in Kingston, Ontario, on November 1, 1915. On his Attestation Form he is described as 18 years old, single, five feet tall, with blue eyes and brown hair. He entered "clerk" as his occupation at time of enlistment, and claimed previous military service with the 35th [Infantry Battalion] Barrie and "C" Battery of the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery. He declared his religion as Church of England.

Gunner Arnot Leatherdale, regimental number 348289, crossed the Atlantic on the S.S. Metagama and landed in England on 9 January 1916. He reported for training at the Shorncliffe Camp near Folkestone. Having enlisted as a gunner, he transferred to the Artillery Reserve Battalion and by July 11, he found himself on the front lines in France with the 3rd Brigade, Canadian Field Artillery.

His work as a gunner would have included taking part in moving, loading, firing, and cleaning the heavy guns, often while under enemy bombardment. Artillery duels were part of daily routine during the First World War, both sides trying desperately to break the stalemate of trench warfare.

Gunner Arnot Leatherdale was killed in action on October 2, 1916, in the area of the Somme, in France, during one of the operations that would become known collectively as the Battle of The Somme. The entry in his unit's War Diary indicates for that day that some batteries had endured bombardment and suffered several casualties. Gunner Leatherdale was killed when an enemy artillery shell went

through the roof of his dugout near the village of Courcelette, killing him instantly.

Four years later, Arnot's parents would have received the awards their son was entitled to: the 1914-1918 British War Medal; the Inter Allied Victory Medal; a Memorial Plaque (a bronze medallion often referred to as "Dead Man's Penny"); and a scroll from King George V. His mother would also have received a "Mother's Cross".

Arnot Thomas Dale Leatherdale is buried at Pozieres British Cemetery located some 6 km north-east of Albert, Somme, in France. In Canada he is commemorated on page 117 of the *First World War Book of Remembrance*, located inside the Memorial Chamber in the Peace Tower in Ottawa. As of November 11, 2018, he is also commemorated on a plaque on the Cenotaph in front of the Coldwater Branch of the Royal Canadian Legion.

We will remember him.

HOW WE ADVOCATE

From the files of Dominion Command

Veterans served to protect the rights and freedoms we enjoy today, and The Royal Canadian Legion is committed to ensuring they receive the care and supports they deserve. The Legion advocates for Veterans' benefits and for the wellbeing of Veterans and their families.

In order to develop our positions and messages to effectively advocate for Veterans and their families, the Legion supports and conducts research, and consults with our members, other Veterans and their families, and with subject matter experts. Our advocacy is consistent with the approximately 20 other Canadian organizations that make up the Veterans Consultation Assembly. With a membership nearly 250,000 strong, we advocate through a number of key activities and processes:

THE DEMOCRATIC VOICE OF LEGION MEMBERS AND THE RESOLUTION PROCESS

The Legion is uniquely positioned to speak on behalf of our membership, which includes approximately 60,000 Veterans, 140,000 family members, as well as persons who support those who served. We are often asked by the Government of Canada and other organizations to present our position on issues because we are the only Veteran service organization that assists Veterans and their families with representation to Veterans Affairs Canada and the Veterans Review and Appeal Board Canada.

There is no one individual or select group within the Legion that determines Legion policy or direction. The Legion has an established and identifiable membership who shapes our policies and direction in a democratic manner. Resolutions are voted on through the chain of command. To find out more about this process, contact your Branch or Provincial Command.

MEETINGS WITH GOVERNMENT REPRESENTATIVES AND SENIOR MILITARY OFFICIALS

In our advocacy role, the Legion brings forward to the Government of Canada issues that affect the wellbeing of

Veterans and their families. The Legion meets regularly with the Department of National Defence, Veterans Affairs Canada, the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Veterans Affairs, and the Senate Committee to initiate change and develop solutions. The Legion has representatives on each of the six Veterans Affairs Ministerial Advisory Groups, working with members from the Veterans' community, family members of Veterans, and other professionals assisting Veterans to develop sound recommendations to improve care and benefits for Veterans.

WORKING ALONGSIDE OTHER VETERANS' ORGANIZATIONS

The Legion connects, builds relationships and shares resources with like-minded Veteran's organizations. The Legion collaborates with key stakeholders, such as the Veterans Ombudsman and the Veterans Consultation Assembly, to identify challenges and press for change to ensure that Veterans and their families receive the care and benefits they deserve.



BUILDING RELATIONSHIPS WITH THE CANADIAN ARMED FORCES AND RCMP

The Legion frequently collaborates with the Canadian Armed Forces and the RCMP to offer programs and services designed specifically for military or RCMP personnel. The Legion conducts frequent outreach to serving and retired military and RCMP to ensure they are aware of the services available to them through the Legion.

SUPPORTING RESEARCH TO FURTHER OUR UNDERSTANDING OF THE ISSUES FACING VETERANS

The Legion is committed to supporting Veterans' research. Through research, we can better understand the scope and nature of the challenges facing our Veterans and their families. The Legion supports research initiatives such as:

- Donated \$1 million to The Royal Ottawa Health Care Group in support of Canada's first brainimaging machine. The PET–MRI machine will help researchers investigate how brain circuitry is linked to depression, suicide, post-traumatic stress disorder, and other mental illnesses.
- Sponsored the annual Canadian Institute for Military and Veteran Health Research forum.
- Provided an annual \$30,000 Masters Scholarship through the Canadian Institute for Military and Veteran Health Research towards Veterans research, helping train a future generation of researchers.
- Hosted the first Homeless Veterans Forum, which included 60 participants from across the country, to discuss the need for a coordinated, national strategy to address the issues facing homeless Veterans.

NATIONAL COMMUNICATION EFFORTS AND ADVOCACY CAMPAIGNS

The Legion informs and educates Canadians about our advocacy efforts and the steps we are taking to improve the lives of Veterans and their families.

ADVOCACY AT THE COMMUNITY LEVEL, THROUGH PROVINCIAL AND BRANCH CAMPAIGNS

Legion members can take an active role and make positive change by adding their voice to the Legion's advocacy efforts. 
THIS MONTH WE REMEMBER

THE BIRTH OF NORAD

In August 1957, Canada and the United States agreed to create the "North American Air Defense Command" (NORAD) headquartered in Colorado Springs, Colorado, as a bi-national command, centralizing operational control of continental air defenses against the threat of Soviet bombers. Formalized in May 1958, the NORAD Agreement has been reviewed, revised, renewed or extended several times since then. As part of its aerospace control mission, NORAD also assists civil authorities in the detection and monitoring of aircraft suspected of illegal drug trafficking. The May 2006 renewal added a maritime warning mission to the command's existing missions. The on-going adaptation of NORAD's mission and capabilities to meet the challenges posed by everchanging threats testifies to the strength of the NORAD Agreement and the close cooperation between Canada and the United States.


