## LEGION RELEASES "IT'S OUR DUTY" POSITION PAPER

OTTAWA, ON, 30 August 2021 – The Royal Canadian Legion released its 2021 "It's Our Duty" position paper to all Canadian Members of Parliament recently. The paper outlines the organization's current advocacy agenda. Among other priorities, the Legion wants to see:

- Immediate tackling of the backlog of disability applications;
- culture change within the CAF related to reporting and handling of sexual misconduct;
- a sharper focus on homelessness including a pan-Canadian strategy to combat Veteran homelessness;
- widespread improvements to the long-term care system.

"We will continue to closely monitor progress and share feedback. Canada now has sufficient background and evidence-based input from support organizations to improve things dramatically - right now," says Bruce Julian, Dominion President.

The Legion is asking Canada's government and all MPs to reduce the number of reports and meetings that rehash the same problems and concepts, and to take immediate action. The Legion develops and updates its advocacy positions annually, based on feedback from members, experiences working with Veterans and partners across the country, and progress on the mandates presented to Veterans Affairs Canada and the Department of National Defence.





The Grants funds balance is \$41,134.32.

Using the above numbers, approx. \$16,015.45 remains in the operating account.

In the General Account, we still have restricted funds of approximately \$4,500 for Seniors Literary, and \$1,000 earmarked for the Cenotaph's Second World War Coldwater Veterans project.

This month's report is providing information about Long Term Care facilities in our region. The information is taken from an Ontario ministry brochure BROC 1702 April 2021 and may be of interest.

Home and Community Care Support Services North Simcoe Muskoka coordinates the accommodation of people in North Simcoe Muskoka's Long Term Care Homes (LTCH). These homes are located across the region and provide a diverse range of specialized and personalized services. All LTCHs are licensed and regulated by the Ministry of Health and Long -Term Care (MOHLTC). The ministry conducts inspections to ensure compliance with legislation and regulations. They also regulate the fees for Long-Term Care and the standards of service. Reports on LTCHs are available at

#### **Accommodation Cost**



There should be little or no cost to the branch, unless the branch chooses to sponsor one or more banners. Most banners would be sponsored by individuals. More details to come. Although the deadline for inclusion in this fall's issue of Ontario Command's Military Service Recognition Book (MSRB), submissions can be made year round and will be published in the next available issue. You can read one below about Private William Edgar Dunn of Coldwater.

During the Second World War Private William Edgar Dunn of Coldwater joined the Algonquin Regiment, Royal Canadian Infantry Corps. He died in February 1945 while serving in The Netherlands.



#### REMEMBERING WILLIAM EDGAR DUNN

William Edgar Dunn was born in Coldwater, Ontario, on July 12, 1925, son of Norman Edgar and Isabella Dunn. After grade school he worked with various employers as a labourer, including a few years with the Canadian Pacific Railway. As he turned 18 during the Second World War, he enlisted in the Army in Toronto on February 2, 1944. Trooper Dunn trained at the Canadian Armoured Corps Training Regiment at Camp Borden, Ont., and later at Camp Aldershot, N.S., before being transferred overseas in October 1944. He was then posted to the Algonquin Regiment, Royal Canadian Infantry Corps. By 1945, Private Dunn was assigned to patrolling along the Maas River, near Heuseden, in The Netherlands. On February 11, 1945, Private Dunn and another soldier were found lifeless in a canal. As they drowned and there were no other signs of physical injury, the circumstances of their death remain unknown. Private Dunn is buried at the Bergen op Zoom Canadian War Cemetery, in The Netherlands. He earned the 1939-1945 Star, the France and Germany Star, the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal, and the 1939-1945 British War Medal.



THIS MONTH WE REMEMBER

#### THE BATTLE OF BRITAIN

Fought between July and October 1940, the Battle of Britain is widely recognized as the greatest air battle of all times and the turning point of the Second World War. It was during that battle that a few hundred aircrew from Commonwealth and Allied countries turned the tide on Hitler's plans for the invasion of Great Britain. The battle is especially significant for our Royal Canadian Air Force heritage since it was during that battle that the RCAF received its baptism by fire. Throughout that period, more than one hundred Canadian fighter pilots served with various units of the Royal Air Force, and with one Canadian unit, No 1 Fighter Squadron (RCAF)

On Sunday September 19, the Coldwater Branch will mark Battle of Britain Sunday by laying a wreath at the Cenotaph.

#### FROM THE MINISTER OF VETERANS AFFAIRS

The following is a letter from the Minister of Veterans Affairs, Lawrence MacAuley concerning the impact of the current situation in Afghanistan on our Veteran community. It is reproduced and circulated here at the request of Ontario Command.

These past few weeks have been incredibly difficult for our Veteran community. With the Taliban's rapid advance across Afghanistan, it appears that the entire country could soon be under their control.

Given all it represents to so many of our Afghan Veterans, the fall of Kandahar will surely be particularly challenging. Having never worn the uniform, I know I will never be able to understand what so many of those who served there are grappling with.

As Minister, though, I want to provide some resources that I hope might be of use for those of you – and to those you serve – who might understandably be struggling with the situation in Afghanistan.

- At Veterans Affairs, please know that the VAC Assistance Service is available 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Veterans, former RCMP members, families, and caregivers can call to speak with a mental health professional, free of charge, at 1-800-268-7708 (TDD/TTY: 1-800-567-5803.)
- For those still serving in the Canadian Armed Forces, support is available to members and their families at each Canadian Forces Health Services Centre across the country.

Because of what Canadians achieved in Afghanistan, lives have been changed, unquestionably, for the better. There are children who received medicine that allowed them to reach their teens when they otherwise wouldn't have. There are now young women studying law, physics, and

journalism at some of the world's finest universities who would never have gotten that opportunity.

Time will tell us what those stories mean, but I choose to believe that the world will be better for them.

However this chapter in Afghanistan's history ends, Canada will not forget the actions of the more than 40,000 of our remarkable men and women who served there the stories of their sacrifice will outlast them.

Our kids and grandkids are going to learn about the Canadians who fought and gave their lives in the streets and poppy fields of Kandahar, just like they will about the ones who fought and gave their lives at Vimy Ridge and Juno Beach.

Their wars might be different, but their stories are fundamentally the same. They went off to serve their country, and they did all that was asked of them and more.

How our Afghanistan Veterans and their families will come to understand their sacrifices is surely not for me to say, but I can promise that Canada will remain forever grateful for their service.

Inspired by John McCrae's "In Flanders Fields", Madame Anna Guérin, later christened "The Poppy Lady from France", campaigned tirelessly in the early 1920s for her Inter-Allied Poppy Day idea: to adopt the distribution of the Poppy on Armistice Day as a way to raise money for Veterans' needs and to remember those who had given their lives during the First World War.



After meeting with her, in July 1921 the Great War Veterans Association (which in 1925 would unify with other Veteran groups to form the Canadian Legion) adopted the Poppy as the flower of Remembrance.

To celebrate this 100th anniversary, The Royal Canadian Legion has produced this commemorative Poppy, a pin reminiscent of the first Poppies distributed in Canada after the First World War.

Legion members are authorized to wear this pin on Legion dress for the entire year, fromJanuary 1, 2021 to December 31, 2021. In keeping with the tradition of wearing the Poppy on the left side near one's heart, it will be worn below the Legion lapel pin and CAF service pin.




