




First off, thank you for your support to attend the Provincial Convention in North Bay earlier this month. It was well attended, well organized and completed a few hours ahead of schedule. Unfortunately, Derek Moore, President elect of Ontario Command, was in hospital following heart surgery. The pre-recorded Zoom acceptance just COULDN'T COMPETE with the bagpipe escort, of our Zone E-4 Commander Comrade Shawn, nor the — pomp of our Provincial installation ceremony!

The three Vice-Presidents stood for the position of 1st Vice President. Comrade Lynn McClellan was elected, with a clear majority, on the second ballot. Seven stood for the position of Vice President. Regrettably, our Immediate Past District E Commander Pam Davidson was defeated for position of 1st VP and eliminated in the race for VP. Crystal Cook, our District E Commander, along with Diane Condon of District B (Golden Horseshoe area) and Mark Rogers of District A (Southwestern Ontario area), were elected Vice-Presidents. Comrade Brian Harris declined to stand a second term as a Vice-President. The good news is that each of these newly elected Senior Officers, President Derek Moore, 1st VP Lynn McClellan, VPs Mark Rogers, Diane Condon and Crystal Cook, support the Seniors Literary Competition.

Donations to various RCL organizations totaled approximately \$595,000; that amount is in addition to the donations received at District and Zone conventions over the past two months.

At District E's recent convention \$295,000 was raised through donations. We should all be proud as District E is

much smaller than many other Districts. That said, I expect donations raised for Ontario Command transition programs since the new year should number in the \$2mm range. Our OC commitment to the provision of service dogs for Ontario Veterans in need continues with the presentation of a cheque for \$400,000 to Phil Ralph representing Wounded Warriors.

The consensus with respect to 'Youth Education' is that branches need to provide more programs for 'youth'. Branches should be considering Youth Darts, Mixed Youth Darts, Corn Hole to get more young people in the branch. The idea is if we provide for them while they are young they may remain with us as adults.

With respect to the MSRB – Military Service Recognition Book, through the past issues, the Legion has received \$1,591,179.37 to support the nine RCL transition programs. Deadline for entries was May 31 and, if they received enough submissions by that date, there may be another issue to follow. These funds are important to the operation of the 'transition programs' so please round up as many military veterans as you can and get them submitted because the Legion needs the commission from each book. The Mefloquin Law Suit was mentioned at the convention and the delegate from the floor requesting information was quickly requested to speak to the executive after that day's proceedings. Hopefully, there will be more to come on that subject which has destroyed the lives of many of our veterans.

Again, thank you to those who supported my request to represent Branch 270. I believe I used your votes well. Thank you for your confidence.

SERVICE OFFICER REPORT

Submitted by Comrade Randy Rice, Branch Service Officer Today for my report to you I am focusing on a group of Veterans in these days there is little known about and how they are recognized for their sacrifice to their country.

These are Veterans who are wounded or injured while in service. We pay tribute to the fallen, but seldom is there mention of the wounded. This was particularly evident during the Afghan War. Strange as it is most Canadians have heard of the Purple Heart, an American award given to U.S. military personnel wounded while in the service of their country. But did you know Canada also has an award, called the Sacrifice Medal. In the past those service personnel wounded were awarded what was known as wound strips, particularly in WW1 and WW2 for physical wounds suffered in battle. There was nothing to acknowledge any sort of mental wound.

Since the time of the Korean War and up to Canada's involvement in the Afghan War the only means of recognizing our wounded personnel was the wound stripe. It was a stripe worn on the lower sleeve of the dress uniform. Today Canada recognizes a wide range of circumstances that would consider a veteran wounded in war and peace.

The Sacrifice Medal was created in 2008 as a result of increased casualties in overseas operations and was a replacement for the wound stripe. It was first awarded November 9, 2009, and was created for those who were wounded or killed while on duty. To this day, 150 have been awarded posthumously. The medal is awarded to those who die as a result of military service or are wounded by hostile action.

An Operation Stress Injury (OSI) or PTSD, on its own, does not constitute eligibility. There are, however, some criteria that provide for the awarding of the Sacrifice Medal for an OSI case once criteria are fully met.

So, comrades, now you know. Essentially, it took another war for Canada to recognize again the sacrifices Veterans have made to their country in war and peace.

POPPY REPORT

Over the past six years Poppy Campaign donations have
totaled roughly \$86,500, with \$28,300 going to Charitable
organizations (Ontario Command transition programs) and
\$17,074 to Veteran Grants (Veterans in need of assistance).
We also managed a few sit-down Veterans' Dinners and
Lunches, and a couple of 'take-out' dinners, during COVID.
A big THANK YOU to our Ladies' Auxiliary for always
providing delicious meals and sometimes bearing the cost.
The objective of the Poppy Fund is to have sufficient funds
available to assist the immediate urgent needs of any

Veteran's family while keeping the balance great enough to cover other expenses covered by Poppy while, at the same time, supporting the organizations being operated by the RCL. Ontario Command's 'Operation-Service Dogs' requires more than \$35,000 to place one dog and handler together. It takes a few years to achieve this placing and in the past six years we have funded the equivalent of 'one hind quarter'!

In the event that a substantial need arises, another funding organization available through RCL is the DISTRICT E HOSPITAL TRUST FUND which can accommodate a larger financial need such as a new deck, furnace, or roof when the Veteran's family finances cannot manage it.

At this time our Poppy Book account stands at \$5,184.17. There are no outstanding invoices, and supplies for the 2022 Poppy Campaign have already been received and paid for, hence, sufficient funds are on hand to accommodate most sudden needs of a Veteran or Veteran's family.

The mandate of The Royal Canadian Legion is to help our military Veterans. A Veteran is a Veteran is a Veteran!!!! Young or old Veteran, they have earned our respect and support. They put their life on the line for us. Please remember why we are here - to assist Veterans.

This is my last Poppy Report to Branch 270. It has been my pleasure to serve our Veterans and community in this role for the past six years.

THIS MONTH WE REMEMBER

THE D-DAY LANDINGS

Determined to end four years of oftenbrutal German occupation, on 6 June 1944, Allied forces invaded Western Europe along an 80-kilometre front in Normandy, France. Of the nearly 150,000 Allied troops who landed or parachuted into the invasion area, 14,000 were Canadians. They assaulted a beachfront code-named "Juno", while Canadian paratroopers landed just east of the assault beaches. Although the Allies encountered German defences bristling with artillery, machine guns, mines, and booby-traps, the invasion was a success.

BRANCH HISTORIAN REPORT

The deadline for submissions of entries for Volume IX of
Ontario Command's Military Service Recognition Book
(MSRB) has now passed. A total of 26 new submissions

were sent in from this branch. You can see on this page an example of an MSRB submission featuring someone who holds a pretty significant place in the history of this branch. Indeed, Thomas Langton was one of the founding members of the Coldwater Branch, and served as its first president in 1935.



THOMAS LANGTON

Thomas Langton Jr. was born in Toronto, on March 26, 1883, the son of Thomas and Florence (McDonald) Langton. On February 28, 1916, he enlisted with the 180th Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force, in Toronto. Attestation Form he is described as 32 years-old and single. He listed his trade as foreman, and stated he had no previous military experience. Langton, regimental number 862770, was commissioned to the rank of lieutenant shortly after joining. Thomas sailed on the S.S. Olympic to arrive in England on November 21, 1916. After several months of training in England he landed in France on April 25th, 1917, assigned to the 75th Canadian Infantry Battalion. He suffered gunshot wounds in the legs on June 8, 1917, and was returned to Canada for medical treatment. Thomas was discharged on April 6, 1918, and later moved to Coldwater, Ontario. In 1935 he became a founding member of Branch No. 270 of the Canadian Legion of the British Empire Service League - today's RCL Branch 270 (Coldwater), and was elected as the branch very first president. Thomas passed away on June 1, 1935, in Toronto.

LEGION RESPONDS: ARBOUR REPORT ON SEXUAL MISCONDUCT IN THE CANADIAN ARMED FORCES

May 30, 2022 - Legion will closely monitor implementation of recommendations

OTTAWA, ON, 30 may 2022 – The Royal Canadian Legion hopes the implementation of the recommendations found within the newly-released <u>Arbour report</u> will lead to permanent culture change within the Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) and rebuild trust.

In a statement released today, the Legion says:

"The Legion supports timely implementation and independent oversight of the Arbour report's 48 recommendations related to sexual misconduct and leadership practices within the Canadian Armed Forces, including seeing sexual assault allegations dealt with under the criminal code. We hope these actions will lead to permanent culture change and rebuild trust in both CAF leadership and the institution itself. The Legion will monitor the implementation of these recommendations in an effort to ensure ongoing transparency and accountability."

CANADA'S VETERANS DESERVE ACTION

May 9, 2022 - Legion urges the federal government to accelerate change

OTTAWA, ON, 5 May 2022 – The Royal Canadian Legion urges the federal government to intensify its actions after the latest update from Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) to our country's Senate Subcommittee on Veterans Affairs.

In a presentation this week, VAC's Minister, the Honourable Lawrence MacAulay acknowledged that more work needs to be done in several areas that are central to our Veterans' well-being, however no detailed action plans or concrete timelines were presented by the department.

The Legion was asked by media for its responses to VAC's update on the condo development planned at Juno Beach in France, and the ongoing disability claims backlog – which

we understand is two years long. Dominion President Bruce Julian shared the following thoughts.

JUNO BEACH CONDO DEVELOPMENT

"The Legion was pleased to hear the Minister confirm that all factions related to this situation in France will be working on a resolution. However, we believe the Government of Canada must play a key role in any mediation that might occur, including suggesting alternate locations for the housing, and even the possibility of purchasing the land that is a fundamental part of our nation's military history and arguably represents a central reason why our country remains free."

BACKLOG IN DISABILITY APPLICATION PROCESSING


"While all progress should be celebrated, we still have close to 11,000 veterans waiting for help while their health situation continues to deteriorate. This reality remains untenable. We did not hear any discussion about tangible plans or specific timelines to finally put an end to this situation. It is unfair to leave those who served our country in a position whereby they must seek piecemeal care while waiting in an endless lineup with an unreliable wait time tool, to receive the full complement of benefits to which they are entitled."

Other topics raised by Subcommittee Senators included Veteran homelessness, the ability of Veterans to find employment after service, the case load for case managers, and the degree of satisfaction expressed by Veterans about service provision.

The Legion is equally interested in these important issues. While we appreciate the work underway and the positive initiatives developed by VAC to date, the pace of change is still too slow to meet the current needs of our Veterans.




