In my report last month I mentioned that I would be writing about King's and Queen's crowns in the next issue. I had forgotten about the Vimy Ridge 100th anniversary, which we are commemorating on April 9. So, instead of crowns, let me tell you about a few items that we have in our collection that relate to Vimy Ridge. We have a map on display that shows the position of the Canadian troops during the famous battle. We have binoculars that are said to have belonged to Lieutenant J.J. Doble, killed at Vimy Ridge while serving with the 116th Battalion. And we have a piece of "trench art", made from a brass shell and a brass blade engraved with "Vimy Ridge 1917". Of course, any one of our artefacts from the First World War may have a link to Vimy Ridge. But perhaps our collection's most important reminder of Vimy Ridge for our community is a large framed photograph (and accompanying plague) of Private Andrew Durnford of Coldwater, killed in action at Vimy Ridge on April 9, 1917. Spring is upon us; with that comes allergy season. It is a good time to remember safe medication practices and usage. When used correctly, medications are largely safe. Prescription and 'over the counter' medications can save lives and help people of all ages manage certain conditions. It is when shared or taken in error that reactions and injury can occur. Seniors who may be taking several different medications can mistakenly cause drug interactions by mixing the wrong pills. Make sure that your doctor knows about all of the medications you are taking including non-prescription products such as herbal remedies, dietary supplements, and vitamins. Many pills look the same; keep them in the original packaging, and double check labels. Store all medications as directed on the label, out of sight and reach of children, and keep dangerous medications locked away. Discard expired or unneeded medications by returning them to a pharmacy. Do not flush or put in the garbage. Also, a reminder that shingles vaccinations are available through your doctor or pharmacy and covered by OHIP for people ages 65-70. To all of the snowbirds returning this month, welcome back! Wishing everyone a safe and happy Easter.

COLDWATER "CHUMS" AT VIMY RIDGE

One hundred years after Canadian troops launched their assault on the now famous Vimy Ridge, it is hard to tell which ones, among the dozens of young men from the Coldwater area who served in the First World War, actually fought in the historical battle. Surviving records held at Library and Archives Canada will confirm that this or that individual was part of a certain unit at a certain time, and whether the unit in question did or did not take part in the battle. Generally speaking, that's about all the official records will confirm. But there are some cases where a direct link to the battle can easily be made, for example when a gallantry decoration with citation was awarded, when the soldier was mentioned in the unit's War Diary, or when he was wounded or killed in action at the time of the battle. Sadly, two of Coldwater's volunteer soldiers fell in the latter group. Private Andrew Durnford was killed in action on the first day of the assault on Vimy Ridge, April 9, 1917, and Private George Hill fell a few days later on April 12. They had enlisted together in Coldwater a year earlier along with other "chums" (as described in a 1917 newspaper clipping), and were serving together in France with the 1st Battalion (Western Ontario Regiment) at the time of their death.

Durnford and Hill enlisted in Coldwater in the spring of 1916, along with James Langley, Charles McKerrall, George Woods, Alexander Dunkin, Samuel Eplett, and Bruce Griffin, all born and raised in Coldwater, or residing there at the time. Once in France, six of them - Durnford, Hill, Woods, Eplett, Dunkin, and Griffin – were assigned to the 1st Battalion, while Langley and McKerrall went with the 116th Battalion. Since both units were in the Vimy Ridge area at the time of the battle, it can be assumed that all of them did indeed, fight at Vimy Ridge. Not long after Durnford and Hill were killed, it was Private Woods' turn to fall on the battlefield on May 3. Then came McKerrall on July 23, Langley on August 29, and Dunkin on November 6. Of the group, only Sam Eplett and Bruce Griffin survived the year 1917 at the front. Both suffered gunshot wounds at the time of the battle for Vimy Ridge. Bruce Griffin was later awarded the Military Medal for bravery in battle.

A century after they gave their lives for their country, we certainly can take a moment to remember who these men "killed in action" were. As was announced in October last year, the Coldwater Legion will continue to recognize each local soldier killed in action in the First World War by flying flags half-staff on the day of the 100th anniversary of their passing. We will also post biographical notes about each individual on our website and Facebook pages. This month we recognize Private Andrew Durnford on April 9, and Private George Hill on April 12. We Will Remember Them.

THE BATTLE OF VIMY RIDGE

If you've been paying attention to the news in recent weeks, you're probably aware that Canadians are getting ready to commemorate the centenary of a battle that, according to many, unified the country by giving it a new sense of a national identity. It was a battle in which, for the first time, four Canadian army divisions (more than 100,000 men) fought side by side as a Canadian Corps, and came out victorious. I am, of course, referring to the Battle of Vimy Ridge. At the time of going to print, thousands of high school kids from across the country (some from our area) have started packing for a trip to Vimy Ridge, part of an effort to ensure that the sacrifices made by our soldiers a century ago are not forgotten by the new generations. So, just in case you haven't been watching the news, here's the Coles Notes version of the Canadian assault on Vimy Ridge.

The Battle of Vimy Ridge began at 5:30 a.m. on Easter Monday, April 9, 1917. After months of intelligence gathering, planning, and rehearsing, a first wave of more than 15,000 Canadian soldiers attacked German defenses, forcing their way through mud, defensive obstacles and deadly machine gun fire. Even the weather was against them. But the extensive preparation and innovative tactics soon gave the Canadians the advantage. Advancing behind a precisely timed "creeping" artillery barrage, Canadian soldiers were able to capture German positions at the critical moment before the enemy could emerge from their bunkers to counter-attack. One hundred years after Vimy Ridge, how do our Veterans fare today? Here's the Legion's view on the latest federal budget announcement:

Federal Budget 2017 – 'Promises, promises' says The Royal Canadian Legion

OTTAWA March 22, 2017 – The Federal Government's budget has checked off a couple more priorities from the Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) mandate letter, but it certainly has missed the opportunity to deliver on key recommendations brought forward by the VAC Ministerial Advisory Groups, specifically, the need for lifelong financial security for ill and injured Veterans. Budget 2017 provides vague promises and no clarity on how the government will deliver lifelong financial security for our Veterans and their families.

Canada's ill and injured Veterans need and deserve financial security, critical supports and benefits, and this budget missed the mark by not delivering substantive details.


"Bottom line, this budget doesn't do enough for our Veterans and their families," says David Flannigan, Dominion President. "How long do Veterans have to wait?"

For those who served to protect the very rights and freedoms we enjoy today, we owe our Veterans our commitment to press Government to ensure the care and benefits they receive are the best they can possibly be.

While Canadians suffered heavy casualties, they were successful in reaching and taking their heavily defended objectives on time. Hill 145, the main height on the ridge, was taken by April 10, and the other significant height nicknamed "the Pimple" followed two days later. At that point, the Battle of Vimy Ridge was all but over, leaving the Allies in control of the high ground overlooking enemy positions. Together, the Canadian and British Corps had captured more ground, prisoners and artillery pieces than any previous British offensive of the war. But there was a cost to the battlefield victory. By the end of the battle, Canadians had suffered 10,600 casualties, 3,600 of them killed.

In 1936 the Canadian National Vimy Memorial was unveiled – it took11 years to build - on the highest point of Vimy Ridge, on land granted to Canada for all time by a grateful France. The monument bears the names of 11,285 Canadian soldiers listed as "missing, presumed dead" in France during the First World War.


The following text is part of a letter written by Marcus Matucci about his experience as a tour guide at Vimy Ridge. It is reproduced here with permission from the Matucci family.

Vimy Ridge. It's a place all Canadians have heard of. It's a were killed there in 1917. Instead of dirt and mud, we have part of our history, our culture, our Nation. Heck, it even made it into our passports, and on the \$20 bill. Never would I have imagined myself working there, and what a ride it was. My name is Marcus Matucci, a 20 year old University of Ottawa student who hails from Richmond Hill, Ontario. I was also one of fifteen Canadian university students working in France for 4 months as a guide, sharing the history of Canada with our visitors.

When I reflect on my time here in France, it comes with a bittersweet taste. The guided tours and interactions with visitors are unforgettable, and to be at such a sacred place makes me proud to represent my country. However, knowing why we're here in the first place is something else. The horrors and losses suffered almost 100 years ago are no longer as poignant as they once were. Walk around the site, and you wouldn't believe that over 3000 Canadians

grass. Instead of a barren wasteland, we have over one million trees. It has truly turned into a site of peace and serenity. Still, the bumps, holes, and trench lines litter what was once a battlefield, serving as a reminder of what the realities really were back then.

The truth is this, there are no veterans from the First World War to tell us about what they experienced, their generation has long passed. However, it is important to us, not only as Canadians, but as people, to remember the sacrifices they made for us. This is why the Canadian government offers this program, so we can be educated, by educating others. Being university students, we are around the same age as a lot of the people who served during this war, giving us a personal connection to those who have fallen. It's a fantastic opportunity to try and work in, eye opening to us who have been so withdrawn from a World War.
