COLDWATER BRANCH SUPPORTS LOCAL AIR CADET SQUADRON

On May 30, 2020, Coldwater Branch President Comrade Norm Marion presented, on behalf of the branch, a donation of \$500 to Captain Megan McKinnon, Commanding Officer of 724 Midland Lions Air Cadet Squadron. Under normal circumstances, the donation to the 724 Midland Lions Air Cadets would have taken place during the squadron's Annual Ceremonial Review in June. But due to the COVID-19 pandemic, all in person activities within the formation were suspended until at least August 31, 2020. Faced with the fact that cadets would not have the opportunity to complete an in person Annual Ceremonial Review this year, the squadron decided to join forces with Royal Canadian Sea Cadet Corps Trillium, also from Midland, and hold a joint virtual Annual Ceremonial Review on Zoom so that cadets could be recognized for their hard work through the year. The virtual event is scheduled to take place on June 6.

As Captain McKinnon announced the end of her tenure as the squadron's Commanding Officer, members of Royal Canadian Legion Branch 270 Coldwater want to thank her for her contribution to the Air Cadet organisation and in particular to 724 Midland Lions Air Cadet Squadron. During her tenure as Commanding Officer, the Air Cadet Squadron and the Coldwater Branch developed and nurtured a close relationship. We wish her good luck in her future endeavours, and we are looking forward to meeting the squadron's new Commanding Officer, Captain Rosie D'Aguiar. Although the change is effective June 10, a Change of Command Parade will be taking place later in October.

During the year Air Cadets of 724 Midland Lions Squadron participate in a number of activities such as drill, team sports, public speaking, leadership training and camping. Under normal circumstances - i.e. non-pandemic situation – Cadets have the opportunity to take part in summer camps or be involved in community events which can be

FROM THE PRESIDENT

Congratulations Comrades! We made it to Week Twelve. Although it feels more like a year. The branch is surviving, even though the doors are locked. Members of your Executive continue to run the place and prepare for reopening, whenever that will be. This past month, we even made the move to Zoom video meetings.



And yes, we even have good news. The Ladies Auxiliary did it again. On May 26, the Ladies made a donation of \$5,000 to the branch to help with the monthly expenses and the upcoming roof repairs. The donation couldn't come at a better time, as the branch has been with almost no revenue for two and a half months. Thank you so much Ladies!

But there were also some sad events. The National Flag at the Cenotaph was once again lowered to half-mast last month in honour of Canadian Armed Forces Snowbirds member Captain Jennifer Casey, who was killed in the crash of a CT-114 Tutor jet on May 17. This was a tough period for the Canadian Armed Forces, with the loss of six aircrew and sailors in the crash of a CH-148 Cyclone helicopter in the Ionian Sea on April 29.

Locally, it was announced that the Annual Decoration Day Service scheduled for June 27 at the Coldwater Cemetery is cancelled, pretty much as expected, due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Also cancelled is the Coldwater Fall Fair that was scheduled for September 25-27.

On the financial side, in answer to our earlier "business interruption" claim through PIB Insurance, the insurer, AVIVA, advised we do not qualify as our closure was due to a lockdown order from the Ontario government rather than through the virus itself. Therefore, our claim was denied together with the business interruption claims of all other Legion branches across Canada that were insured through AVIVA.

Also, we are looking into other options including the Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA) program, which is meant to provide interest-free loans to small businesses and not-for-profits to help cover their operating costs during a period where their revenues have been temporarily reduced. It is not clear whether we would qualify for this. A loan through the Legion organization (Ontario Command) is another option.

Finally, I remind everyone AGAIN that the best way to avoid catching and spreading the COVID-19 virus is to wash your hands frequently with soap, and practise social distancing. Stay home! Stay safe! And if you do have to go out shopping, bring a mask along – and hopefully wear it!

VETERANS SERVICE OFFICER REPORT

Some news of interest for veterans.

Family members of Canadian Military Veterans whose mental health funding was cut off by the federal government during the past year will once again be allowed to access services, which can only be approved when a Veterans psychiatrist believes it will improve their mental health.

The annual CNE held in August as well as the Warriors Day Parade have been cancelled. This is only the 2nd time in its history, the 1st being during the Second World War.

Craig Dalton, the Veterans ombudsman has resigned after eight months in office. The office has been in place for 13 years with a mandate to assist Veterans. Criticism exists that questions how independent the office is of Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) and how effective the office is in addressing Veterans concerns.

The Prime Minister announced today that funding will be available to establish a Chronic Pain Centre of Excellence at McMaster University to focus on research, training and education to provide Veterans with services they need.

THIS MONTH WE REMEMBER

**THE ARDENNE ABBEY
MASSACRE**

On June 8, 1944, seven Canadian prisoners of war are murdered in the garden of the Ardenne Abbey in France. Eleven Canadian soldiers were killed there in cold blood the previous day. This Second World War atrocity is known as the "Ardenne Abbey massacre."

The execution of prisoners of war is a direct violation of the Geneva Convention and a war crime. SS Colonel Kurt Meyer and the 12th SS Panzer Division will be held responsible for the murders of at least 18 Canadian soldiers from the North Nova Scotia Highlanders and the Sherbrooke Fusiliers Regiment. Meyer will be tried after the war and convicted for these war crimes.

LEGION JOINS CHORUS OF ANGER OVER CONDITIONS IN LONG-TERM CARE *Calls for improvements largely ignored by governments for years*

OTTAWA, ON, 29 MAY, 2020 – The Royal Canadian Legion is demanding better and humane treatment for Veterans and Seniors in all long-term care centres in Canada. This comes after a damning report about conditions in some Ontario centres, as observed by the military's Joint Task Force (central). The Legion sent a letter to Prime Minister Trudeau this week, asking for immediate action not just in Ontario but across the country.

"Many of our Veterans are in long-term care, and to know that some of them are being mistreated and ignored is shameful," says Thomas D. Irvine, Dominion President. "The fact that our governments have known for a long time that some of our most vulnerable citizens are living in deplorable conditions during their final years of life, is disgraceful. We need a systemic overhaul – and now."

Previous governments have failed to address this ongoing issue adequately and Canada now finds itself in a deadly quagmire. It took a pandemic to truly expose this multi-faceted crisis. The Legion's letter, which was copied to all provincial and territorial leaders, follows its strongly worded statement released in the wake of the military's exposé:

The Royal Canadian Legion vehemently condemns the life-endangering and unethical actions in long-term care facilities in Ontario as reported through military Joint Task Force (central) observations. These homes are failing our most vulnerable citizens. We demand that today's acknowledgement by the Prime Minister and Premier of Ontario of this "disturbing" and "gut-wrenching" reality be

followed by immediate actions to provide safe and humane care for our Veterans and Seniors – in Ontario and across the country. – The Royal Canadian Legion, May 26, 2020

The Legion has long been asking for an improvement in access to long-term care beds for Veterans, and for better conditions in care centres. There has been limited success when it comes to provision of beds, and some care centres may be doing well, but the overall living conditions for Veterans and Seniors in Canada are woefully inadequate.

Through the Legion's Ontario Command, evidence and opinions have been shared for over 20 years – with Prime Ministers, Ministers of Health, Premiers, local leaders, local Health Units and others. Letters to government leaders were written and ignored. Stories about problems with feeding, health care, cleanliness, unchanged undergarments and more, were provided. Outside groups have shared similar stories, and bountiful research about how to improve conditions, exists.

"We have been shouting from the rooftops for many years," says Dave Gordon, Chair, Veterans Services and Seniors Committee at Ontario Command. "In most cases if not all, many staff members at long-term care facilities are underpaid for the work they do."

In an effort to help, the Legion's Ontario Command itself has made millions of dollars in financial donations to Ontario long-term care homes over many years. Other Legion Commands and Branches have made contributions in many parts of the country as well.

"The time to act and end this intolerable situation, is now," says Irvine. "After what they have done to help build the foundation of the society we enjoy, our Veterans and our Seniors deserve much better in their later years."

The Legion thanks Canadians for their support of our Veterans and their families, and our communities during this challenging time!







INTRODUCING VETERAN BILL COLESHAW

In 1954 Comrade Bill wanted to be part of a worldier picture. His brother had enlisted in the army two years earlier and his sister was in the Women’s Army Corps. Comrade Bill reported for basic training in London, Ipperwash and Cedar Springs, Ontario, T.O.S. 1st BN RCR in August 1954 (Taking on Strength, first Battalion, Royal Canadian Regiment).

In 1955 he earned his wings as a paratrooper. He served seven years in Canada and five in Germany where he opted to participate in an infantry signal course resulting in his rank as CPL. L1 GP2 (Corporal, Leading Infantry, Group Two).

Comrade Bill received his Special Service Medal for service in Germany from 1955 to 1957 and his Canadian Forces Decoration for his twelve years of service. In 1958, he was part of a Canada-wide military first-aid competition, and his team won the St. John’s Mary Otter Trophy.

When asked about meals away from home, Comrade Bill quickly responded that the best military food was always at the air force bases in Canada. From 1955 to 1957 as part of the British Army on the Rhine, the troops received field pay which meant they were paid one-half of their monthly allowance in British army currency which could only be spent at National Army Stores or Restaurants.

With fond recollection, Comrade Bill attributes the military of instilling in him the importance of team work, leadership and respect for everyone. He also shared that humour goes

a long way. While on exercise in Germany as a radio operator he recalls the Battalion Commander stopping his jeep and asking the Company Commander, “How’s it going?” The reply, “I think I’m lost sir.” The Battalion Commander replied, “Besides that, how’s it going?”

At the time of his release from the forces in 1967, Comrade Bill and his wife Patsy returned to Coldwater and together worked at a local automotive company. At

this time Comrade Bill transferred his Thedford Branch membership to Branch 270. Shortly after his transfer, volunteer opportunities as Sergeant-at-Arms and First Vice-President paved the way for his presidency for the 1971-1972 term. New civilian opportunities presented themselves and Bill and Patsy moved to Oshawa where Bill worked as a Quality Control Supervisor in the radio department of an automotive company.

Albeit this was a telephone/email Veteran Interview, this author could not help but hear the twinkle in this Veteran’s voice when he shared that Patsy and another Cub Scout Leader were on a bus outing with a troop of boisterous cub scouts. Bill and other soldiers were hitchhiking along the Queen Elizabeth Way. The ladies wanted to settle down the youngsters and asked the bus driver to pick up the uniformed soldiers. The rest is history. Love at first sight! Comrade Bill shared, “I’ve noticed a lot of team spirit in the Branch in the short time I’ve been back in Coldwater. There’s nothing I can see I would change in Branch 270 at the moment.

Comrade Bill, we thank you for your service.


