70 YEARS OF LADIES AUXILIARY

On Sunday May 6, the day that the Coldwater Branch is holding its elections, our Ladies Auxiliary will be celebrating the 70th anniversary of receiving its charter. Indeed, this represents 70 years of outstanding, dedicated service to the branch and to the Coldwater community. Official documentation about the early years of the organization is scarce, but thanks to a few articles penned by original charter members we get a glimpse into some of their activities. Early on in the development of the Royal Canadian Legion, wives, mothers and sisters of Service men were not allowed to join the Legion, but they were eligible to be members of a Ladies Auxiliary.

So it was that on February 10, 1948, a group of Coldwater women met for the first time to organize the Ladies Auxiliary of Branch 270. The charter, dated May 6, 1948, lists the following names as founding members: Grace Brodeur; Margaret Emslie; Marjorie Brown; Ruth Danby; Zoe Dunlop; Vera Godfrey; Velma Godfrey; Mary Jacob; Eva Lovelace; Kathleen Lye; Viola Lye; Rose Manning; Helen Polkinghorne; Doris Robertson; Audrey Sallows; Eileen Sallows; Jessie Sallows; Catherine Stevens; Annie Watt; Rosella Weatherall; Grace Worell; Cora Lane; Jean Haines; Margaret Devitt; and Georgana Douglas.

Catherine Stevens, one of the charter members, describes how the Ladies used some initiative in the early years when the Legion Hall was not suitable to hold functions. "*The Hall being very small, we catered to banquets in Manning's Music Hall* [across from today's Home Hardware]. Branch members set up a cook stove on the stage. Food was prepared at home and carried to the hall where we attempted to keep it warm. Dishes and cutlery were borrowed from other organizations." At special functions such as Remembrance Day, the Ladies cooked and served for more than 200 people. At \$1.25 a plate!

Members of the Ladies Auxiliary are known for their delicious food served at functions and banquets, but they do so much more than cooking and serving. Throughout the year they are involved in all kinds of fundraising efforts that benefit the branch, our Veterans, the local youth and the community. Today's membership in Branch 270 Ladies Auxiliary is 49, with many ladies holding membership in both the Ladies Auxiliary and the Branch. Thank you so much Ladies, and Happy 70th!

WHAT YOU SHOULD KNOW BEFORE VOTING

In anticipation of the Branch election to be held on May 6, the following article is reprinted from the *General By-laws for Branches of the Ontario Provincial Command*

of the Royal Canadian Legion, as amended to July 2017. Members are encouraged to consult up-to-date Legion Bylaws and guidelines publications available on-line on the Provincial and Dominion Command websites. Some printed copies are also available from the Branch office.

ARTICLE IV - QUALIFICATION TO VOTE AND/OR HOLD OFFICE

401. Only Ordinary, Associate and Affiliate-Voting Members, in good standing, shall have the right to vote or hold office.

402. A voting Member, to be eligible for election to any Branch Office, must be in good standing for the year in which the election is held.

403. A voting Member will be required to have served at least one (1) term on the Branch Executive Committee to be eligible to be elected President or Vice-President.

404. (1) A voting Member will be required to have been a Member of the Branch for a period of one (1) year prior to the date of the election to be eligible for election to the Branch Executive Committee.

(2) Branch Regulations may require a voting Member to attend a minimum number of or minimum percentage of General Meetings and the period of time during which the minimum attendance must have been attained prior to the date of the Election Meeting.

NOTE: Where a Branch enacts a Regulation for this purpose, it will be necessary that it keep an accurate record of attendance of all Members present at General Meetings.

405. (1) No Member who is a full time, regular part time or elect to work employee of any Branch or Command or any organization thereof, who

receives directly or indirectly any salary or wages for or on account of any service rendered to the Branch or Command or any organization thereof, shall be eligible to hold any Executive position in the Branch. Any employee as defined in this section who is successful in his bid for office must resign his paid position before his Term of Office can commence.

(2) Notwithstanding the provisions of this section, Members of the Ladies' Auxiliary employed by the Branch or Command may, at the discretion of the Branch or Command, hold Office in the Auxiliary.

- 406. No Member shall hold more than one elected Office in the Branch.
- 407. The Offices of Secretary and Treasurer shall not be held by the President or any of the Vice-Presidents.
- 408. The President shall not hold the position of Ladies' Auxiliary Liaison Officer.
- 409. The Term of Office shall be for one (1) year unlessBranch Regulations make provision for a two (2) year term.
- 410. (1) An Appointee to any Office, Committee, Standalone Position, or other Position associated with a Branch shall serve at the pleasure of the appointing authority.

(2) For the purpose of Honours and Awards, any appointment shall be deemed to be effective upon the date of such appointment by the appointing authority.

INTRODUCING VETERAN EDWIN J. BOURQUE

Now in his fifty-third year as a Legion Member, Comrade Edwin 'Eddie' Bourque left his Cap-Pelé, New Brunswick home to join the Army at the age of sixteen. In 1953 recruits were mostly men and Private Bourque served with the Second and Third Canadian Guard for the period 1953-1954.

This career choice was due in part because he had friends who had enlisted and it seemed like the natural progression to follow suit. Comrade Eddie is bilingual. He served in Petawawa, Pembroke and Québec City.

Comrade Eddie recalls his early days. "It was scary; I was a small town boy. I was sent immediately to Petawawa and found myself as part of three platoons, each platoon with approximately 30-40 men." But life in the military played out exactly as he had hoped. There was discipline, good and plentiful food and opportunity to travel outside of his home province. He never regretted his early career choice and felt he had made the right decision.

At this time in his life, his military experiences focused mainly on the Parade Square where recruits performed military drills and tasks in full uniform with all equipment and ammunition. He enjoyed learning the 'army way of life' and looked forward to future deployments.

Comrade Eddie was not witness to any combat or conflict as he succumbed to physical injury within the first year of his enlistment. Comrade Eddie was granted leave to visit home and upon his return to the military he was stationed in Québec City. His injury precluded him from joining his platoon's deployment to Germany or from participating in future parade square exercises. Comrade Eddie was retired from further service duty and he returned to New Brunswick from where he chose to travel to Toronto to join his brothers.

Comrade Eddie worked in industry for many years but recalls that his time in the military made him understand the value of family. Comrade Eddie likes to hunt and recalls that because of his tender age, he was not allowed to pursue his passion of a 'sharp shooter' while in the military. Bringing this interview home to Branch 270, Comrade Eddie would like more recognition to be given to the older Veterans. Having written this, he went on to mention that in the past two-three years our Branch has put forth a concerted effort in recognizing our Branch Veterans. In answer to 'is there anything you would like to add to this interview?' Comrade Eddie said, "Opportunities like this...to be interviewed are appreciated." **We thank you for your service.**

BATTLE OF THE ATLANTIC

From the files of Veterans Affairs Canada

Ed. note: In Canada the Battle of the Atlantic is commemorated every year on the first Sunday in May, this year on May 6.

The Battle of the Atlantic was Canada's longest military engagement of the Second World War, lasting from September 1939 to May 1945. This battle was bravely fought by the men and women of the Canadian Merchant Navy, the Royal Canadian Navy and the Royal Canadian Air Force. More than 4,600 courageous service men and women lost their lives at sea.

Canada's role in the Battle of the Atlantic was large and significant. Starting from a tiny base of ships, aircraft and personnel, and an infrastructure of meagre proportions, Canada became one of the foremost Allied powers in the Atlantic war. By 1942, Canada was able to carry a major share of the defence of North American waters and, at the same time, was Britain's principal partner in the defence of trans-ocean convoys. By 1944, Canadian forces had developed the strength and capability to provide a significant contribution to the British and Americans in other theatres of the war.

WOUNDED WARRIORS CANADA AND THE ROYAL CANADIAN LEGION ONTARIO COMMAND FORM SERVICE DOG PARTNERSHIP

The Royal Canadian Legion - Ontario Provincial Command (RCLOPC) and Wounded Warriors Canada are proud to announce a partnership that will see Wounded Warriors Canada's PTSD Service Dog program expand within the Province of Ontario. The RCL-OPC will provide \$225,000 to fund ten PTSD Service Dogs who will be paired with ill and injured Veterans and their families in Ontario. This announcement follows the recent news that the Canadian General Standards Board has withdrawn its intent to produce a National Standard of Canada for Service Dogs. Sharon McKeown, Provincial President, Ontario Command, commented, "In 2015, a moratorium was placed on the use of Poppy Funds for service dogs, until Canadian National Standards were developed. Over three years later, frustrated with the lack of progress in developing these standards, we began resourcing other Provincial Commands with Service Dog Programs. We wanted to lift the moratorium to permit donations to a Service Dog Program, however, it was essential the provider be recognized. Partnering with WWC, who had been working with our Comrades in the East and West was a natural step. The mandates of WWC and the Royal Canadian Legion are basically alike, ours the care and comfort of Military and RCMP Veterans, theirs includes First Responders. Going forward, we will work together to develop a successful partnership in service to our Veterans and their families."
