

### FROM THE PRESIDENT

Welcome to November everyone! Leaves are falling, rain is coming down, and, by the time you read this, we will be taking the shovels out of the shed and putting the snow tires on the car. The Poppy Campaign officially opened on Friday, October 29. If you wish to

Preparation for Remembrance Day is still on-going. Even after the Ontario government announcement of the loosening of restrictions, we are still planning for more or less a repeat of last year's ceremony, with prepositioned flags and wreaths, and no marching troops. Representatives of the government, the Canadian Armed Forces and the Legion will be the only ones laying wreaths during the ceremony.

### REMEMBRANCE DAY CEREMONY

There will be a Remembrance Day ceremony at the Cenotaph in Coldwater on November 11. Unfortunately, once again this year, there will be no marching or standing parade, no military troops or Cadets, and no indoor reception afterwards. The only active participants in the ceremony will be members of the Coldwater Legion Branch chaplain, and a few executive, a government representatives and members of the Canadian Armed Forces. ### TREASURER REPORT

The remaining total is a result of a \$12,600 grant deposit on 20 Oct and a subsequent cheque written for \$5,337.15 to pay for the sound system in the upper hall.

In the General Account, we still have restricted funds of approximately \$3,900 for Seniors Literary and \$1,000 for the Cenotaph's Second World War Coldwater Veterans project.

### SERVICE OFFICER REPORT

As Veterans Week and Remembrance Day approach we take time to honour the men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice in Canada's conflicts.

Every November 11<sup>th</sup>, there are people who inadvertently break or disregard the law as it pertains to the wearing of someone else's medals. For some people, it's their way of remembering their relative. I went to the Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) web site for clarity, and this is what it says under Frequently Asked Questions:

Q. Can I wear my relative's medals?

A. Medals may only be worn by the Veteran. It is a criminal offense to wear military medals that someone else has earned.

For the Veteran who lost their medals or the relative who is interested in obtaining a Veteran's lost medals, VAC offers a solution.

Q. How much does it cost to replace medals?

A. There is no charge for replacement medals for the Veteran to whom they were awarded or their surviving partner. However, for eligible next of kin, there is a fee for replacement medals. The fee for each medal varies. Application forms are available on their web site.

### **REMEMBERING ALLEN 'TOM' THOMPSON**

Originally from Toronto, Allen "Tom" Thompson joined the Royal Canadian Navy as a cook in 1959. Thirty-five years and twenty-two ships later, Chief Petty Officer 2<sup>nd</sup> Class Thompson retired from the Canadian Armed Forces in 1992. During his career Tom served on the East and West Coast of Canada; spent five years in Kingston, Ont., on Recruiting; experienced two tours of duty in Damascus, Syria; He has served in the Canadian Arctic, the Orient, South America, and the Caribbean.

Chief Petty Officer Thompson was recipient of several medals and awards from the Canadian Forces and the Royal Canadian Legion. A 55-year member of the Royal Canadian Legion, Tom recently moved to the Sunnybrook Health Centre in Toronto, where he passed away on November 1 at age 79.

# THE NORTH WEST MOUNTED POLICE

On November 17 1903, Inspector Francis Joseph Fitzgerald of the North West Mounted Police builds a police detachment in the High Arctic, on Herschel Island in the Beaufort Sea. The island is part of the Yukon Territory, despite the presence of American whalers. It will be Fitzgerald's base for six years, during which he will stop the whisky trade and collect customs duties, asserting Canadian sovereignty under difficult conditions. The Nova Scotia veteran of the Boer War will die with three colleagues on their way to Dawson City in 1911, a trip that will become known as "The Lost Patrol."

# ONTARIO ENSHRINING THE RIGHT TO WEAR POPPIES IN THE WORKPLACE

From the Ontario Ministry of Citizenship and Multiculturalism

TORONTO, Oct 28, 2021 – The Ontario government is introducing legislation today that, if passed, would amend the Remembrance Week Act, 2016 to give Ontario workers the right to wear a poppy in the workplace during Remembrance Week. By wearing a poppy, Ontarians remember the bravery and valour of Canadian Armed Forces veterans and active members who fought to preserve peace around the world, protect Canada and defend its freedom and way of life.

"Our government is grateful to those in uniform, past and present, who have selflessly dedicated themselves to serving our country and protecting our values," said Parm Gill, Minister of Citizenship and Multiculturalism. "They deserve our unwavering respect, support and gratitude. We show that by wearing poppies, helping to ensure our children and grandchildren never forget the sacrifices they have made for us."

An exception to the proposed right to wear a poppy will apply if wearing a poppy poses a danger or hazard to the health, safety, or welfare of any person.

As part of the government's continued efforts to honour and support veterans, the legislation, if passed, would also amend the preamble to the Remembrance Week Act, 2016 to state that poppies are worn during Remembrance Week as a symbol of remembrance and respect.

Ontarians come together to proudly wear poppies and support veterans in their community through the Royal Canadian Legion's annual poppy campaign. Funds raised from the campaign go towards providing grants for veterans in need by funding facilities and transition programs and providing supports for veterans and their spouses who are hospitalized.

By enshrining in law the right to wear a poppy in the workplace and its status as a symbol of remembrance and respect, the government is reminding employers that Ontario owes a debt of gratitude to the brave people who serve our country, and that should be reflected in their employment policies and practices.

### **Quick Facts**

• The proposed amendments, which would come into effect upon Royal Assent, would align with the purpose of the Remembrance Week Act, 2016 of promoting the voluntary observance of Remembrance Day in recognizing the extraordinary courage and profound sacrifice made by the people who gave their lives for Canada in military service.

Following the matches, all jerseys will be individually signed by the players and become available for auction starting on November 11.
