#### **TREASURER REPORT**

The Grants funds balance is \$41,134.32; however, this amount is to be reduced by a yet to be confirmed amount that will be returned to the Receiver General for Canada. Using the above numbers, approx. \$15,657.83 remains in the operating account.

In the General Account, we still have restricted funds of approximately \$4,100 for Seniors Literary, which takes into account the recent \$400.00 payout of prize money to this year's winners, and \$1,000 ear marked for the Cenotaph's Second World War Veterans project. The Bottle Drive deposits to date for the month of September total \$1,141.40. This number is included in the above calculations.

#### SERVICE OFFICER REPORT

Sherry Culling the Provincial Service Officer out of North Bay visited the branch on Wednesday 22 September to provide assistance to Veterans. I got the chance to touch base with her.

Comrades, living amongst a pandemic has produced many difficult and challenging times to many people; Veterans and their families are no exceptions. Veterans Affairs Canada and the Royal Canadian Legion are there to help. Your responsibility as a Veteran is to seek help if you require it. My job is to assist you. During my tenure as Veterans Service Officer for Branch 270 I have helped dozens of Veterans in and around the Coldwater area navigate through the bureaucracy of the Royal Canadian Legion and Veterans Affairs Canada to obtain the assistance required as a result of military service.

I am a Veteran myself and understand what dignity and pride means to a Veteran. I understand the frustration with red tape, bureaucracy and rejection. It can be overwhelming and leave one with a sense of hopelessness. However as your service officer it is my responsibility to make that process less overwhelming and more user friendly.

Over the years I have heard many reasons for not seeking assistance. Here are but a few.

I'm not really a Veteran. It's too late for me. Others need assistance more than I do. Too much paperwork. I can't be bothered. I don't have time. I'm okay, I don't need it. I'll be dead before anything happens. I only served a short time. I'm too old. I applied years ago without success. My application got lost. I don't qualify. I served in the militia. Nothing I can't handle. It's not important. My situation isn't serious enough. Everyone will know my business. Lots of guys get hurt or injured while serving and I was told to suck it up. Nobody really cares. Veterans Affairs will turn me down. And finally, I was only doing my duty.

Service is service. The fact you voluntarily served your country qualifies. All too often many Veterans get left behind because of these reasons. This is wrong. The process starts by contacting the service officer and filling out a Legion claim form. It takes minutes and is completely confidential. The toughest part of the process is making the decision to seek help. The most important piece of info on the form is the Veterans Service number and we all remember that! Filling out the form can change your life and I've had many people say. "I should have done it years ago". There are many organizations that provide assistance to Veterans, but none have the structure or scale of the Royal Canadian Legion. Did you know that there are approximately 700,000 Canadian Armed Forces Veterans (post WW 2 and Korea) and only a small portion receive assistance.

So comrades, I leave it with you. If you need assistance please reach out. It's there. What do you have to lose? My contact info is as follows:

# CANADA'S MOST DECORATED SOLDIER

Who was Canada's most decorated soldier at the end of the First World War? "Billy Bishop, of course!", most people would answer when asked that question. After all, Air Marshal William Avery Bishop was a highly decorated fighter pilot who was awarded the highest British gallantry decoration - the Victoria Cross. But he was not Canada's most decorated man. This title belongs to Wing Commander William G. Barker, also a fighter pilot. Credited with fifty aerial victories, William Barker had emerged from the First World War as one of the leading Canadian flying aces and Canada's most decorated hero, having earned the Victoria Cross (VC) for his actions on 27 October 1918. He was also awarded the Distinguished Service Order (DSO) with Bar, Military Cross (MC) with two Bars, Croix-de-Guerre, two Italian Silver Medals for Valour, and three Mentions-in-Despatches (MID).


MILITARY SERVICE RECOGNITION BOOK: Volume VIII of Ontario Command's MSRB is complete and a small number of copies have been received at the branch. This volume features 30 individuals related to the Coldwater area, and another dozen of individuals not related to the area, but for whom the submissions were processed through this branch. Work is already in progress for Volume IX for next year, so keep the submissions coming. Submissions can be made year round and will be published in the next available issue. You can read one below about Private Charles Stanley Robinson of Coldwater.

#### **REMEMBERING CHARLES S. ROBINSON**

Charles Stanley Robinson was born in Coldwater, Ontario, on December 13, 1891, the son of Ambrose Robinson and Anna Sundeen. On April 16, 1915, he enlisted in the Army with the Canadian Expeditionary Force in Toronto. He was 23 years old and single. He listed his trade as telegraph operator, and had no previous military experience. Private Robinson, regimental number 163, sailed on the *S.S. Corinthian* to arrive in England, on May 27, 1915. After getting some training in England, he landed in France on January 21, 1916, and was assigned to the Canadian Corps Cyclist Battalion. On October 11, 1916, he suffered a gunshot wound, but returned to duty in December. After the war ended, he was repatriated to Canada and discharged on January 30, 1919. He passed away on November 16, 1987.

#### LEGION'S 2021 NATIONAL POPPY CAMPAIGN SET TO LAUNCH

From the files of Dominion Command.

OTTAWA, ON, 29 September, 2021 – Unique new features will be part of the Royal Canadian Legion's 2021National Poppy Campaign, which officially begins on Friday, October 29th. New features are being implemented in commemoration of the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Poppy symbol this year, and to increase the creative and convenient ways in which donors can support the yearly campaign.

"We are pleased to expand our Poppy campaign this year and happy to once again work alongside some great partners to make it all happen," says Dominion President Bruce Julian. "Because of these collective efforts, Canadians will be able to donate in new and engaging ways to support our Veterans - even in the midst of the pandemic."

Traditional Poppy boxes will still be used for cash donations and lapel poppy distribution. As part of an ongoing pilot project launched in 2020, the Legion's "Pay Tribute" tap and pay boxes will be featured once again. The digital boxes will offer new donation amount options and traditional poppies. The number of locations across the country will increase to 1000. More details will follow upon the official campaign launch.

Donors will also be able to donate directly through the Legion's national website. Close to 20 million dollars is donated during the National Poppy Campaign each year and goes directly into initiatives to support Canada's Veterans.

#### New "Immortal Poppy" and Digital Poppy



The Immortal Poppy is new this year and is on the cutting edge of digital art. In recognition of the Poppy's 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary, one hundred pieces of digital Poppy artwork will be created and auctioned off to the highest bidders.

Funds raised through the initial art offerings, will go directly to the National Poppy Trust Fund. More information will be released in the coming weeks. "Technological advancements offer new opportunities, and we're excited to provide multiple options to make it easy for people to support the campaign," explains Julian.

The 2021 Digital Poppy will remain part of the overall campaign. By visiting www.mypoppy.ca people will be able to donate to receive a digital poppy which can then be shared with friends and family through social media.

Funds raised through the Digital Poppy will go directly to the Legion National Foundation, a separate entity from the Legion but whose work also helps Veterans, Families and Communities in a multitude of ways.

#### **New Legion Yard Signs**

The Legion has launched a respectful new way to help donors show their support. Attractive new yard signs are available to show caring for Canada's Veterans during the



Remembrance period and beyond. The recyclable signs are now available through poppystore.ca. Some Branches across the country are also selling them locally.

National proceeds go into general revenue to support the work of the Legion in helping Veterans. Proceeds from local sales go directly to Branches. To date, over 7,000 signs have been sold.

#### National Ceremony, Wreaths, Ceremony Locator


On November 11, the Legion will offer a Facebook Live presentation of the National Remembrance Day Ceremony. It is anticipated that national broadcasters will cover the ceremony as in the past.


For the second year in a row, spectators will be discouraged from attending in person due to pandemic limitations. Those participating directly in the ceremony will be required to remain 2 m apart and will need to wear masks unless performing certain duties. Other anticipated changes to the national ceremony this year will be released in the coming weeks and will be updated at Legion.ca.

People will still be able to take part in the National Ceremony in a symbolic way by purchasing a memorial wreath that will be pre-positioned at the National War Memorial in Ottawa before the event. More details will be available at Legion.ca starting October 1.
