In addition to hosting thirsty and hungry visitors who came through the Legion during the event, some of our members took part as street vendors, or dressed-up participants.



THIS MONTH WE REMEMBER The Battle of Britain

Fought between July and October 1940, the Battle of Britain is widely recognized as the greatest air battle of all times and the turning point of the Second World War. It was during that battle that a few hundred aircrew from Commonwealth and Allied countries turned the tide on Hitler's plans for the invasion of Great Britain. The battle is especially significant for our Royal Canadian Air Force heritage since it was during that battle that the RCAF received its baptism by fire. Throughout that period, more than one hundred Canadian fighter pilots served with various units of the Royal Air Force, and with one Canadian unit, No 1 Fighter Squadron (RCAF)

On September 16, the Coldwater Branch will mark Battle of Britain Sunday by laying a wreath at the Cenotaph.



SERVICE OFFICER

If you have received or are receiving benefits or a pension from Veterans Affairs Canada, then you have in your possession a VAC Blue Cross card identified by a K number. This card identifies what benefits you are receiving. If there is a change to your health, it is your responsibility to notify VAC as soon as possible, so those changes can be addressed by VAC. It is not the responsibility of branch Service Officers to do that for you. VAC will not release information to a branch Service Officer due to safeguarding the relationship and confidentiality they have with you the Veteran. It is critical that you fill all paperwork you receive from VAC or the provincial Legion Service Officer in a timely manner. The Service Officer can assist you with that paperwork if necessary. Applying for assistance to the Legion when you are already covered by VAC only delays and adds to confusion to get you what you need. Keep in mind that there is no quick fix here. Things take time.





COLDWATER REMEMBERS LANCE CORPORAL WILLIAM NEWLOVE

On August 27, 2018, the Coldwater Legion lowered its flags to honour Lance Corporal William Metcalfe Newlove of Coldwater, who was killed in action 100 years ago while serving on the front lines in France.

William Newlove was born on May 3, 1883, in Richmond, Yorkshire, England. By the beginning of the First World War, William had moved to Canada and was residing in Coldwater.

On November 11, 1915, he enlisted in Orillia with the 157th Overseas Battalion of the Canadian Expeditionary Force. He was 32 years old and married. On his Attestation Form he is described as 5 feet 5 inches tall, with brown eyes and brown hair. He identified his religious denomination as Church of England, and his trade as labourer, with no previous military experience.

Private William Newlove, regimental number 643999, sailed to England on the S.S. Cameronia, arriving on October 28, 1916. After some training in England, he landed in France on February 11, 1917, to join his front line unit, the 116th Canadian Infantry Battalion (Ontario County), part of the 3rd Canadian Division.

William Newlove, by then promoted to the rank of Lance Corporal, first suffered gunshot wounds in shoulder and thigh during operations around Vimy in the spring of 1917. Following several months of recovery, he rejoined his unit and returned to action. In the morning of August 27, 1918, shortly after leaving the "jumping off" trench for an attack on Bois du Sart near Arras, he was killed instantly by an enemy shell. His battalion's casualties by the end of the attack were 45 killed, 227wounded, and 23 missing.

Two years later, William's wife, Alice, would have received the awards her husband was entitled to: the 1914-1918 British War Medal; the Inter Allied Victory Medal; a Memorial Plaque (a bronze medallion often referred to as "Dead Man's Penny"); and a scroll from King George V. She would also have received a Memorial Cross ("Mother's Cross").

Lance Corporal William Metcalfe Newlove is buried at Visen-Artois British Cemetery, Haucourt Department of the Pas-de-Calais, France.




Lance Corporal William Newlove was serving with the 116th Canadian Infantry Battalion (Ontario County) when he was killed in action 100 years ago near Arras, France.

He is commemorated on page 477 of the *First World War Book of Remembrance*, located inside the Memorial Chamber in the Peace Tower in Ottawa.

We will remember him.

INTRODUCING VETERAN GEORGE MEDLEY CAMPBELL

At age fifteen, former Sea Cadet George boarded the train to Shotley, England to join the Royal Navy as a Boy Seaman aboard the HMS Ganges. His sea-legs come from following in the footsteps of his father and grandfather.

This boarding would lead to many ports of call: the Mediterranean; Persian Gulf; the Far East; South Africa; the West Indies; the Scottish Islands, Norway, South Africa, and the Falkland Islands. Add to these travels a Christmas spent on a diamond mine at the edge of the Kalahari Desert, four hundred miles from Cape Town.

His first trip away from England was to the neighbouring European countries; then to the Mediterranean and the Persian Gulf. Comrade George will never forget his first sighting of Gibraltar and stated that visiting Malta was *"reliving ancient history"*. Two of his most memorable experiences were when they were twenty miles off Cape Town, South Africa and they sighted the Table Mountain Range *"it was so beautiful and looked like you could touch it"*. While sailing in Lagos, Nigeria they managed to run into a whale which, miraculously, survived.

In 1960, Able Seaman George was in Kuwait in the Persian Gulf where he spent three months aboard one of four destroyers in blistering heat; 54+C (130 degrees Fahrenheit) with no air-conditioning. While in service Comrade George did not see combat or conflict but reports there were casualties caused by human error. *"In those days, we didn't have the benefit of helicopters to air lift casualties to the nearest medical facility - we did the best we could until we reached shore."*

As a Seaman Gunner, Comrade George was responsible for the general maintenance of the ship such as the HMS Finisterre with 250 seamen onboard. He trained and is a qualified butcher and on his last ship, serviced eight hundred seamen with their dietary needs plus was responsible for the issuance of the daily rum and beer rations and all record-keeping of the stores.

Comrade George is the recipient of the General Service Medal, Borneo Clasp as he spent one and a half years protecting the Malaysian Confederation from the Indonesian Communists. He also participated in the Jungle Warfare Training in Kota Bharu in Malaya, and performed duties at Border Patrol in Sarawak, an independent country (later a province of Malaya, Malaysia). In 2013, Comrade George was awarded a medal from the Malaysian Government for protecting Malaysians from January 1963 to July 1964.

After twelve years at sea, amateur boxer, Comrade George left the Royal Navy and returned to Liverpool, England. His brother in Canada sponsored George so he could be his best man. George met the love of his life and the rest is history. In 1979 he started his carpet cleaning business which is an ongoing enterprise.

Comrade George's closing comments: life in the Royal Navy allowed him to develop positive life-long values and taught him the importance of camaraderie. George has a proclivity for warmer climate but before departing for his six month hiatus under a warmer sun, he participates in our Veterans' Dinner and is thankful for our Legion and our Branch.

His last comment..."the interview was not a third degree and while travelling through Texas, wearing my Veteran's Cap, I have been stopped and thanked on numerous occasions for my service."

We thank you for your service.
