The General Account bank balance on November 17, 2020 stood at \$15,444.85 and after allowing for any outstanding cheques, the actual balance at November 17 would be approximately \$12,167.22, with two restricted use amounts — one for the Seniors Literary Fund of roughly \$4,000 and a grant that was obtained for electrical to the cenotaph of \$3,500 which we hope we will be able to utilize before the time period expires. This allows an operating account of about \$5,000. The Building account is at \$20,401.78, and the Nevada account is at \$237.00.

THIS MONTH WE REMEMBER

THE DEFENCE OF HONG KONG

In the Second World War, Canadian soldiers first engaged in battle while defending the British Crown Colony of Hong Kong against a Japanese attack in December 1941. The Canadians at Hong Kong fought against overwhelming odds and displayed the courage of seasoned veterans, though most had limited military training. They had virtually no chance of victory, but refused to surrender until they were overrun by the enemy on December 25th. The fighting in Hong Kong ended with immense Canadian casualties: 290 killed and 493 wounded. The death toll and hardship did not end with surrender. Those who survived the battle became prisoners of war and many endured torture and starvation by their Japanese captors.

UPDATE FROM THE MINISTER OF SENIORS, DEB SCHULTE

The following is an update from the Minister of Seniors on a very important advocacy issue for the Legion, keeping seniors in their own homes as long as possible – safely and injury free!

Seniors across the country agree that they want to keep living in their own homes for as long as possible — safely and injury free.

The Government of Canada <u>recently announced</u> the new <u>Aging in Place Challenge Program</u> led by the National Research Council. It will partner with like-minded private, public, academic and other research organizations in Canada and abroad to develop breakthroughs to help older adults and their caregivers to live safe, healthy and socially connected lives while remaining in their homes and communities of choice.

The aim is to reduce by 20 per cent the number of older adults requiring nursing home care across Canada by 2031.

The program will support safe and healthy aging in four areas:

- Safety: Innovative living environments and injury prevention at home
- Health: Cognitive monitoring and enablement, chronic health management and daily living support
- Connection: Mobility, transportation and social engagement
- Standards: Smart home standards that support safety, and enhance technical interoperability

The program is currently seeking researchers from the academic community, the not-for-profit and private sectors, and Indigenous governments to <u>express their interest</u> in collaborating. A panel of experts with lived experience will also be created. Seniors, caregivers and advocates who wish to share their real-world insights and experience are invited to <u>submit</u> their interest.



The family road trips across the USA, then by airline to Hawaii, the Caribbean, Mexico and Florida presented Bruce many unique adventures. Travel in Mexico introduced Bruce to the joy of experiencing 'peso cabs' (shared taxi-service) in Mexico City. He learned that the lack of a common language is not a barrier to playing marbles with other children. Climbing pyramids and visiting Aztec sites lured his interests and developed in him a passion for archeology.

Bruce commented that at this tender age he appreciated how privileged he was to live in Canada. Further, what he learned about people, history, and culture during his travels far outweighed what he missed in classroom time. Comrade Bruce received his Masters of Applied Science in Electrical Engineering and it was at his first job that Bruce was awarded a commemorative pin for his three month's work on the space shuttle's Canadarm. Bruce had a twenty-eight year affiliation with IBM Canada after which he spent four years as a councillor at one of our neighbouring townships.

Now retired, Bruce has opted to make 'more' an important word in his vocabulary. He looks forward to more opportunities to learn, laugh, share and carve time to pursue one of his passions, swing-dancing. When asked, "Looking back, what would you have done differently?" Bruce replied with "Too many things to list." Looking back he would make changes in his life otherwise it would be "Like saying I didn't learn anything."

Bruce is an accomplished creative writer (Page 7, Oct. 2020 issue of Maple Leaf) and is the 2020 First-Prize Winner of the Seniors Literary Competition for his short story submission, *The Collector*. Bruce has graciously accepted to lead the Coldwater Writers Group for the 2020-2021 term.
